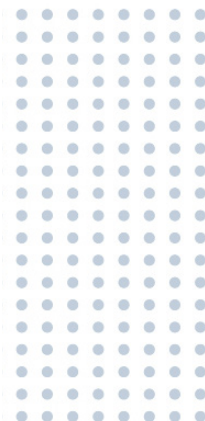

Dear Colleagues and Supporters,

As we reflect on 2024, I am excited to share the notable progress and innovative initiatives that have defined Every Learner Everywhere's journey this year. It has been a year of change, growth, and reflection on our mission to advance digital learning for every learner in higher education.

We began 2024 by welcoming four new partner organizations to our network. These additions have greatly expanded our capacity to create and deliver innovative services in the field of digital learning, enhancing our ability to serve institutions and learners alike.

This year, we were fortunate to receive two pivotal grants that have propelled our work forward. These grants enabled us to offer three of our current services by Achieving the Dream (ATD), the Association of Public and Land-grant Universities (APLU), and the Online Learning Consortium (OLC) to multiple institutions, free of charge. Additionally, they supported the development of two new generative AI literacy services – one for faculty integrating AI into their classes, and another for academic leaders crafting policies on AI use in academic work. They also allowed us to embark on a strategic planning process focusing on sustainability, update our services

to better align with institutional needs, and create new e-learning opportunities that can be provided both to institutions, and directly to individuals.

Throughout 2024, we maintained our commitment to our foundational goals. We continued to publish resources for the field, collaborate with intermediaries for scale (IFS) organizations and our network partners to provide services, host our annual Strategies for Success webinar series, and fund our student internship program.

Our thought leadership reached new heights as we shared our insights at 19 national conferences, further establishing our role as a leading voice in digital learning and educational excellence.

I want to express my heartfelt gratitude to the Every Learner Advisory Council for their guidance throughout the year. Their expertise and dedication have been significant in navigating the complex landscape of digital learning.

Last but not least, I extend my deepest appreciation to the Every Learner team, our network partners, our funder, and to WCET for their commitment to the success of the network. The year ended in a transition period when the previous director, Karen Cangialosi, left, followed by a full team reorganization, and everyone played a crucial role in making the network even stronger.

As we look to the future, I am filled with optimism about the potential of our work to create more relevant and effective digital learning environments. Together, we are not just adapting to the digital age – we are shaping it to benefit every learner.

Thank you for your continued support and partnership.

NETWORK IMPACT

2024 marked five full years of the network offering services and resources to the field of higher education. In those years, we have engaged with 1265 institutions in all 50 US states and 6 territories, as well as 50 countries.

We have delivered 190 services to institutions, awarded 195 awards through 13 different professional development badges, added 275 resources to our free resource library, and posted 238 blogs.

2024 was a busy year in which the network delivered 6 institutional services to 43 institutions. Our ten webinars were attended by 3,039 participants from 320 unique institutions and with nearly 100 institutions attending multiple webinars. Our partners delivered 29 presentations at 19 conferences. Over a million visitors to our website downloaded our resources 9,339 times and viewed our videos 3,769 times. There were 89,228 blog views in 2024, 124 media mentions, and 653 citations of our resources.

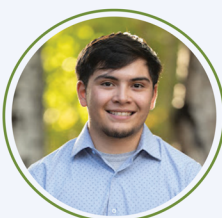

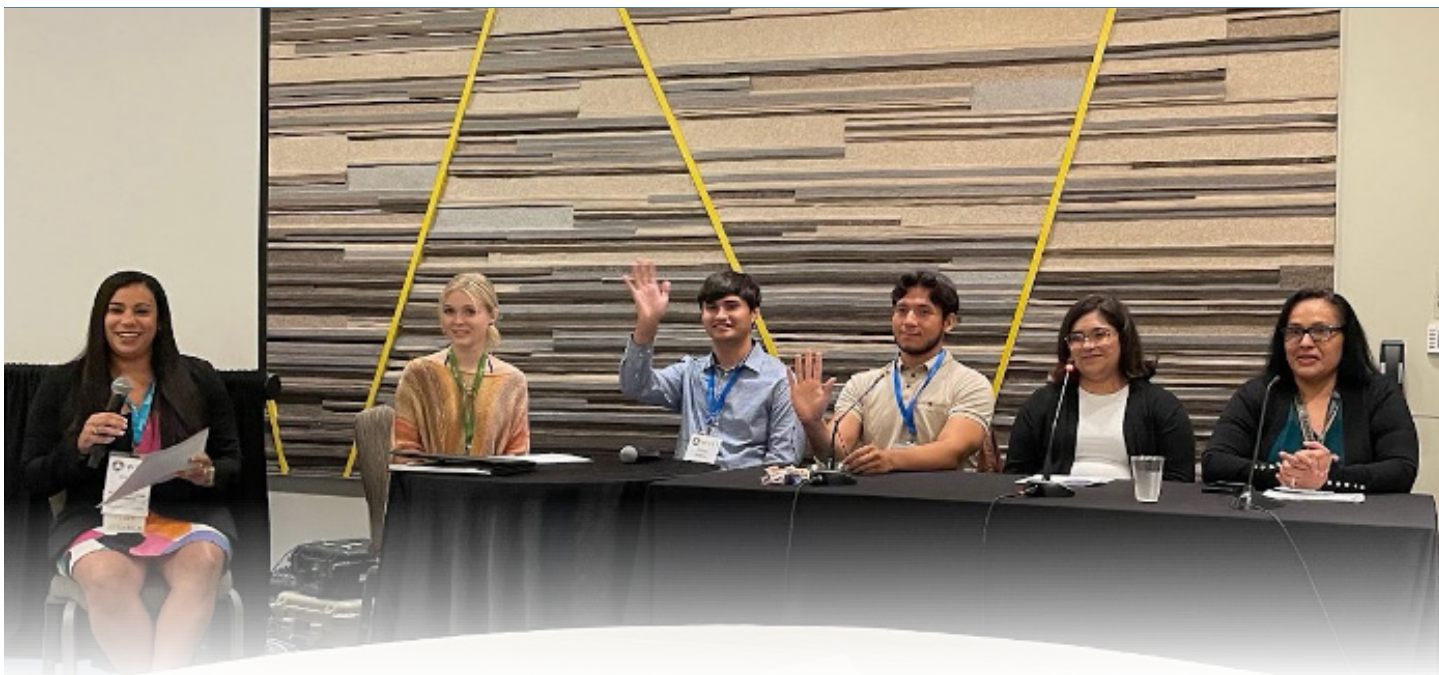

WCET Student Panel

In October 2024, several of our team members attended the 36th WCET Annual Meeting in Long Beach, CA. One of the sessions there featured five local students who shared their experiences with the evolving role of generative AI in education. The session emphasized how humanizing the student experience involves building meaningful relationships, fostering empathy, and supporting students' social-emotional well-being. The student panelists shared valuable insights into their experiences in inclusive learning environments, with faculty humanizing the student experience, and their perspectives on ways AI integration can lead to enhanced student engagement, and a more supportive learning environment for all students.

September 19, 2024 – Baltimore, MD

Along with the network backbone team and our program officer, representatives from ten network organizations convened for a day of discussion, reflection, and strategic planning. We began by reaffirming the value of the Every Learner Network and its role in supporting institutions through collaboration, expertise, and innovation. We also reviewed planning strategies for the next phase of work in 2026–2027.

Our network evaluates and supports a diverse range of services from our Technical Assistance (TA) partners, ensuring they align with the needs of intermediaries for scale (IFS) institutions while fostering collaboration, customization, and issue resolution. We also centralize operations, provide strategic guidance from our funder, highlight partner achievements, and facilitate a student internship program that brings meaningful contributions to the network and higher education community.

Cathy Shaw, Managing Director at Tyton Partners, presented findings from her research with the Ada Center in *Journey of HBCUs to Technology and Digital Learning*. Through campus visits, she assessed technology strategy, procurement, and implementation support. A key insight from her research underscored that for historically black colleges and universities (HBCUs), technology investments are not just about financial resources but also about empowering the people who use the technology.

The rpk Group led a strategic planning session examining the strengths, challenges, and gaps in the current digital learning service and support landscape. Discussions centered on how the Every Learner Network could help fill these gaps, culminating in a capacity-building exercise focused on sustainable business models.

We concluded the convening by reflecting on lessons learned from our institutional service partnerships with IFS organizations. Key takeaways included the need for agility in tailoring our strategies to six distinct IFS approaches, deeper collaboration to advocate for greater process consistency, and a commitment to strengthening coordination. To support this, we will implement quarterly TA Partner meetings for process updates and continue individualized meetings to launch services, conduct check-ins, and review service outcomes.

Every Learner worked with four partner organizations, Achieving the Dream, The Association of Public & Land-grant Universities' Personalized Learning Consortium, Digital Promise, and Tyton Partners, to develop and facilitate a service for guiding faculty in equitizing their syllabi. Faculty at Lehman College, who completed the service, had this to say in the [Equitizing Syllabi Case Study](#).

"Even if faculty have been teaching for a long time, there are almost never enough opportunities to think deeply about the way we design learning experiences, especially with fast-paced innovation in technology and continuously evolving learners' needs."

Two faculty at Stephen F. Austin State University took lessons learned from the Every Learner service, Digital Learning Equity Framework, and used it to analyze and improve their online courses. The bases for their analysis is [Caring for Students](#), a collaborative resource developed by ATD and OLC. Together they documented their experience in [Digital Learning Equity Analysis Project: A Collaborative Self-Study and Implementation Exercise for Improved Equity-Centered Practices](#).

By participating in the Every Learner Everywhere micro-credential training and by modifying it for a peer feedback model, the researchers were able to extend the benefits of the training to a broader group of educators and promote a culture of continuous improvement. The project's success underscores the importance of ongoing professional development opportunities for educators in digital learning environments.

With the rapid shift to online learning in recent years, it is essential that educators are equipped with the skills and knowledge necessary to promote equity and inclusivity in their courses. The Digital Learning Equity Analysis protocol and the modified peer feedback model serve as valuable tools for educators seeking to improve their own courses and promote equitable practices.
